IMAGINE SOMEONE has a heart attack and is given a plan instructing them to stop eating fatty foods. If they have another heart attack, we don't ask whether they followed their plan. We treat the heart attack. We don't condemn them for the lifestyle that they may be living that's causing the heart attack and requiring them to take up a bed in the ER.

Yet if someone has an addiction or mental illness, we start keeping count of the moments where they need support — whether they've lost their house, lost their job or used a substance to cope. Mental health and addiction support is consequence-based, and with each incident, people lose chances.

One out of every 5 Canadians will experience a mental illness this year. There has been a 79% rise in opioid overdose deaths since the onset of COVID-19. One in 4 youth struggle with their mental health. Each and every one of those people deserves our support.

By opening our doors and providing housing and support services to people experiencing complex mental health and substance-use concerns, we're opening possibilities. Providing these services in Halton will build a healthier, stronger community.

As you'll read in our Impact Report, by strengthening our services, aligning and developing our housing assets, and better integrating our supports within the care continuum, we're ensuring that everyone who needs support — receives support.

place to live is a pre-condition of health and wellness. This has been the guiding premise for Support House since we opened our doors to Chartwell, our first seven-bedroom location, almost 40 years ago.

Unfortunately, the need for support has grown exponentially. Today, Support House operates three congregate homes in the Halton Region. Privacy is a key component of health and wellness. Our agency is moving towards private units in our new builds.

In Burlington, our townhomes provide shared housing for 26 tenants. In Acton, upgrades to our Maria Street location are fully funded and underway. In Oakville, our Grace House location on Cornwall Road will soon be rebuilt providing 37 single unit apartments. These projects will increase our owned units by over 50%, allowing us to open our doors to many more people who feel they have nowhere to turn.

HARM REDUCTION recognizes that substance use is rooted in trauma, brain chemistry and coping mechanisms. Helping people to reduce the harms associated with their use can be lifesaving.

Our Board of Directors has endorsed Org Code Consulting's harm reduction strategy recommendations.

30-45 Unit Project

Pursue a 30-45 unit site-specific harm reduction supportive housing project in Halton.

Scattered Units

Pursue at least 30 scattered site harm reduction supportive housing units.

Advisory Group

Form a Persons With Lived Experience Advisory Group to help guide our supportive housing projects and scattered-site harm-reduction housing.

Partnerships

Explore key partnerships related to effective service delivery for people living in our units.

Safe beds and detox

Explore the delivery of a few non-medical detoxification and safe beds at our facilities.

Capacity Building Initiatives (Internal, Community & Partners)

With the guidance of Canadian Equality Consulting, we've developed a DEI strategic action plan with staff, client, and community engagement and we have reviewed our job descriptions to support diverse, equitable and inclusionary hiring.

We received \$65K in seed funding from the United Way Hamilton & Halton (UWHH) for further DEI capacity building in 2024. This will include the review of policies, the creation of a DEI onboarding manual and training opportunities for Support House and our community partners.

To further support our team and modernize our training, we secured \$100,000 in funding through the Community Services Recovery Fund via UWHH to develop our Employment Skills Development e-learning platform. The platform will offer accessible skills development opportunities for our community members as they pursue employment and volunteer positions as peer support workers and experience-based advisors.

STUDIES SHOW that investing in supportive housing and peer support programming saves across the healthcare, social services and justice sectors. Simply stated, supportive housing is foundational to health and wellness.

A person in social housing costs \$613 per month. If that person were in a shelter, it would cost three times that. A correctional facility? Seven times. A hospital bed? That would cost \$20,000-plus per month.

We are working closely with the Halton Region's Coordinated Housing Access Team in order to prioritize the intake process to get those most in need into valuable and limited housing.

This includes transitioning or diverting people quickly out of high cost options like shelters and hospitals, and into our supportive housing options.

With the addition of our Housing First Response Team as of June 2023 we are actively meeting people who are unsheltered such as in encampments, in order to wrap supports and work alongside them to find shelter and a home.

Investments in supportive housing provide people with improved health and social outcomes. It helps reduce systemic and structural inequities; provides community and belonging through inclusion and strengthens our housing and public health systems. This build will result in overall cost-savings for all orders of government.





We will break ground on our new Cornwall Road location by mid-2024 to open our doors by 2026. The site will feature:

- A mix of 37 bachelor and 1-bedroom units for adults living independently in the community.
- A common area and program space that promotes relationship building.
- Tenant support onsite 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

- Supports designed to assist residents in their move from transitional to long-term permanent housing and independent living.
- Fully accessible units made available for those who need to age in place.
- Affordable units geared to residents' income.

The Cornwall Road redevelopment is a \$20 million project. With potential grants, we expect to need to raise \$4 million.

It is possible to make a difference for those among us who are struggling, stigmatized and vulnerable. Together, we can ensure that they will be supported with dignity, reflecting the compassion of this great community. These projects will increase our owned units by 50%, allowing us to open our doors to many more people who feel they have nowhere to turn.



MHA Alliance

The Mental Health and Addictions Alliance — comprised of ADAPT, Summit Outreach and Housing, STRIDE, Hope Place Centres, CMHA-HRB and our agency — have continued to work in partnership across funding opportunities. We have also been renewing our governance structures in order to develop innovative care solutions to MHA supports under our new Ontario Health Teams. This collective work has been essential to our strategic thinking and our systems approach to MHA supports across Halton.

Burlington Ontario Health Team (BOHT)

Our MHA Alliance has also been integrated into the governance incorporation at the BOHT. As a result, MHA will be represented through a population-based approach. The Alliance influence and progressive BOHT integration of our work will have lasting impact on the development and incorporation models of OHTs into the future.

Connected Care Halton-Ontario Health Team (CCH-OHT)

The CCH-OHT has been at the forefront of rethinking care for the unhoused population in Halton including care coordination pathways with our community partners.

That coordination has supported our work serving the unhoused population in Halton. We hope to bring more resources and supports to those facing the most barriers to health through our coordinated work with our partners over the next year.

Region of Halton (ROH)

We continue to work with ROH to coordinate our MHA supports for the unhoused population in Halton. With the Region's \$1.10M funding for our Housing First Response Team we have moved to the forefront of progressive housing first strategies — assisting people to move from encampments to housing and supports.

The Region's \$6.0M capital investment in our new 12-unit apartment build at 47 Maria St in Acton will have significant impact for the people that are housed there in 2025.

SUPPORT HOUSE'S Centre for Innovation in Peer Support is a "Benchmark of Excellence" in peer support in Ontario. The Centre's Provincial, System and Partner team provides evidence-based offerings to drive innovative best practices related to peer support and meaningful engagement and co-design alongside those with lived/living experience and family/caregivers.







Does our support impact your daily life?


